## Guiding questions to help metacognitive modeling and understanding:

What did it take to spark revolution in the colonies?

Why did the British impose taxes and laws on the colonists after the French and Indian War?

What would King George say to the colonists in New York about their revolution?

Why did a change of government in New York signal the quest for liberty?

Why was New York so important in the War for Independence?

How did the patriots suffer defeats during the Revolutionary War?

What military strategies defended New York from the British?

How did patriots and loyalists differ in their attitudes, beliefs, and actions?

How did leaders make a difference?

How did alliances with Native Americans make a difference for both sides in the Revolutionary War in New York?

What if the colonists did not choose independence?

How is New York today different because of the Revolution?

Who were strong NY leaders? What were some great decisions they made? Why?
